7. Remarks By the Mayor

Mayor Fuller first reminded everyone of the 15th annual Alabama sales tax holiday for school related items that starts on Friday, July 17 and ends on Sunday, July 19, 2020. Mayor Fuller then asked for everyone's help with raising awareness for wearing masks in public due to the COVID-19 numbers increasing again. Mayor Fuller stated he and the council do not want to mandate mask wearing in public but if the numbers of infected and hospitalizations keep climbing, they may have to do so.

1. Presentation of Resolution honoring Anne M. Grady.

Mayor Fuller invited President Pro-Tem Jones, Barbara Patton and Dr. Grady up to honor former City Council President Anne M. Grady. Barbara Patton, the first female Mayor of Opelika, spoke first about her time with Mrs. Grady including being the City Council President during her first term as Mayor of Opelika. Mayor Patton listed all of their many accomplishments together and also described Mrs. Grady as a great leader of not only the city council but of many other organizations as well. President Pro-Tem Jones, the first female African-American and longest serving council person for the city of Opelika, spoke next about her time with Mrs. Grady starting in 1995. Ms. Jones recalled Mrs. Grady taking her to her first league convention and how influential Mrs. Grady was for her personally when she first began serving on the city council. Ms. Jones also mentioned, at her recommendation and under Mrs. Grady's leadership, they were able to pass the Carver/Jeter plan to better serve those areas and also how Mrs. Grady was a great friend and mentor to her for many years. Ms. Jones also explained how she started a team of all

female elected officials for Relay for Life walks and how Mrs. Grady always participated and how much that meant to her. Mayor Fuller then explained how Mrs. Grady was on the AMEA board when he was on the council and she ended up taking him to a board meeting with her. Mayor Fuller stated had no idea what they were talking about but she did and she passed that on to him and now he is the chairman of the AMEA board. Mayor Fuller then thanked Dr. Grady for his wife and her service and read the resolution aloud. Dr. Grady spoke lastly and shared a story about his wife and thanked the Mayor and council for the resolution and portrait of his wife being presented to him.

Kenny Frazier of 2502 Stonybrook Rd spoke first. Mr. Frazier voiced his concerns about the spread of COVID-19 and how he believes it is time for the city to mandate the use of masks in public. Mr. Frazier explained he believes if left up to the public to wear masks the situation will not improve and in his opinion the city should go ahead and mandate the use of masks in public.

William Bowhall of 2016 Old Lafayette Hwy spoke next. Mr. Bowhall explained how he has had no luck getting any representation and how corrupt our government system is currently toward low income individuals. Mr. Bowhall went on to explain about ten years ago he was so frustrated with this that he filed nine different federal lawsuits against multiple agencies, companies and individuals and was still denied legal representation. Mr. Bowhall asked for the help of the council to find a way for him to get some type of political or legal representation so that he can get his ideas out there instead of being ignored like he always has been.

Ali Rauch of 1903 Arbor Ln spoke last. Mrs. Rauch formally introduced herself to the council as the new President of the Opelika Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Rauch thanked the council for their continued support of the chamber and stated that she is looking forward to working with them going forward.

Mr. Canon asked if the city is receiving any monies from the other power companies that operate in the city limits besides Opelika Power Services. Mayor Fuller answered by saying they have to pay attachment fees to the city. Ms. Jones asked Mr. Gunter when the director of Opelika Power Services negotiates with the other power companies, is it only the six areas Mr. Gunter described. Mr. Gunter answered that all of the documents the director would be authorized to sign and all the locations would be located in the city limits but they are outside the service areas of Opelika Power Services. Mr. Gunter explained that all the areas in question were annexed at some point into the corporate city limits after 1984 and they all need street lights even though they are supplied power from either Alabama Power or Tallapoosa River Electric Cooperative. President Smith gave an example of Northeast Industrial Park having all 3 power companies supplying power in that area. Mr. Gunter also mentioned this came up recently with the new subdivision of Hidden Lakes as well because it is supplied power by Alabama Power Company and Opelika Power Services has to have a contract with them to pay for the services of the street lights in that area too. Mayor Fuller also gave a couple of examples of different places that also have this issue and he agreed with Mr. Gunter about recommending passage of the resolution to let Derek Lee, director of Opelika Power Services, handle all these negotiations. Ms. Pitts also added that Towne Lakes, where she lives, also is serviced by Alabama Power.

1. Character Trait of the Month - Courage, the quality of mind or spirit that enables a person to face difficulty, pain or danger without fear.

President Smith read the character trait of the month and asked if there was any other business that needed to come before the council. Ms. Pitts asked City Engineer Scott Parker about ALDOT possibly adding a traffic signal near Southview Elementary School and the status. Mr. Parker stated there is no status at this time and that ALDOT requested the city do a traffic study there and that was right before the schools were shut down due to COVID-19. Mr. Parker also stated when the schools open back up, they will do the traffic study and make recommendations at that time. Ms. Pitts stated in her first year on the council, she thought she remembered a traffic study being done at that intersection. Mr. Parker confirmed there was a study done then and ALDOT requested more from them to approve a traffic signal there and the city has been following their requests but they have not been able to complete the process yet. Ms. Pitts also asked Mr. Parker about the sidewalk in front of the high school and the plan for them to be able to cross the street there at the intersection. Mr. Parker confirmed this is part of the plan there, and there is funding for it in the roadway improvements project this year and they need to coordinate with ALDOT to finish. Mr. Canon asked if it only pertained to the crossing of the highway or if it also included the sidewalk parallel to the highway. Mr. Parker stated there is an existing sidewalk parallel and it will only be for crossing the street. Ms. Pitts then asked if there was an update on the re-painting of the utility polls on S. 4th St. City Administrator Joey Motley stated they are still waiting on the contractor and the polls have to be completely dry and it's a scheduling issue, but if they can't do it they will find someone else who can.

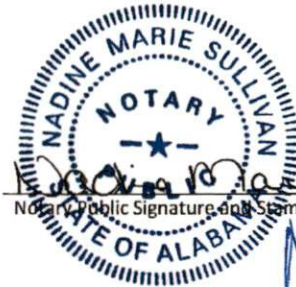

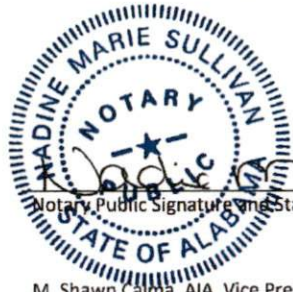

The Grantee is responsible for compliance with state and any applicable local Solid Waste Management Plans and regulations and requirements of Alabama Recycling Fund and completion of the activities in the Grant Application that was submitted by the Grantee, except as modified and superseded by this agreement.

I. GENERAL PROJECT SUMMARY

Lee County is requesting 6 steel dumping hoppers to increase efficiency in sorting and processing at the Lee County Recycling Facility.

Auburn University is requesting a vertical baler to increase productivity and efficiency of their campus collection.

The City of Opelika is requesting 200 96-Gallon carts to increase their participation rate. They are also requesting 2 14' trailers and 1 8' trailer to increase cardboard collection.

A. MILESTONES/TIMELINE OF ACTIVITIES

The grantee agrees to begin the implementation of the project during the grant period outlined in this agreement, conditional upon the grant agreement being signed and becoming a binding contract.

If this grant agreement includes the disbursement of funds for any purpose as may be deemed operating subsidies by the Department, the grantee shall provide to the Department, in the form of a written report submitted within one (1) year of grant execution, documentation that such subsidies will no longer be required from any future Alabama Recycling Fund Grant or Fund disbursement.

VII. FAILURE TO COMPLY

This Agreement is entered into between the East Alabama Recycling Partnership (Grantee) and the Alabama Department of Environmental Management (Department) pursuant to an appropriation from the Alabama Recycling Fund (Fund). This Agreement will provide for a recycling project in Lee County, Alabama.

The parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Scope of Services

The Grantee will provide services as set out in the Scope of Services, which is included with this Agreement as Attachment A and which is incorporated as if fully set out herein.

2. Payment

A. The Department agrees to reimburse the Grantee an amount not to exceed \$40,327.77 for the services performed under this Agreement. Unless otherwise specified in the workplan, any mileage, travel and per diem costs identified in the budget located herein will be reimbursed in accordance with state law.

B. Unless pre-approved by the Department, the Grantee shall submit invoices not more than once per semi-annual period and in conjunction with the semi-annual report to the Department for actual cost(s) incurred. The final invoice shall be submitted by October 15.

C. Prior to the purchase of any items or the execution of any printing contracts under this agreement with a value less than \$1,000.00, one quote or attempt for a quote of outside costs, including but not limited to copying costs and freight terms, must be obtained. For items with a value from \$1,000.00 to \$3,000.00, two such quotes or attempts for quotes must be obtained. For items with a value greater than \$3,000.00, three such quotes or attempts for quotes must be obtained. The purchase of any items or the execution of any contract shall comply with the Alabama Bid Laws Sections 41-16-20 et. Seq. of the Code of Alabama (1975).

3. Term of Agreement

All work performed under this Agreement shall begin on the date on which this Agreement is executed unless previously approved by the Department, and shall terminate 12 months from the date of execution unless extended by the Department. This Agreement is conditioned upon the receipt of sufficient funds from the Fund and is subject to termination in the event of proration of the Fund. If the term of this Agreement extends beyond one fiscal year, this Agreement is subject to termination in the event that funds are not appropriated for the continued payment of the contract in subsequent fiscal years. This Agreement may be amended by the mutual written agreement of both parties but under no circumstances shall the expiration date be extended or the contract amount be increased without approval in accordance with Section 29-2-41 Code of Alabama 1975.

4. Termination of Agreement for Cause

If, through any cause, the Grantee shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligation under this Agreement, or if the Grantee shall violate any of the covenants, agreements or stipulations of this Agreement, the Department shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the Grantee of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof at least 30 days before the effective date of such termination. In that event, any finished or unfinished studies, reports or other work by the Grantee shall, at the option of the Department, become its property and the Grantee shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed under this Agreement.

5. Termination for Convenience of the Department

The Department may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to the Grantee of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least 30 days before the effective date of such termination and under the same conditions as herein set forth for the Department, the Grantee may cancel this Agreement. In the event of cancellation, all finished or unfinished studies, reports or other work by the Grantee shall, at the option of the Department, become its property. If the Agreement is terminated by the Department as provided herein, the Grantee shall be paid for all work satisfactorily completed prior to termination.

6. Changes

The Department may, from time to time, require changes in the Scope of Services of the Grantee to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increases or decreases in the amount of the Grantee's compensation, which are mutually agreed upon by and between the Department and the Grantee shall be incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement.

7. Title VI and Equal Employment Opportunity

It is agreed that the terms and commitments contained herein shall not be constituted as a debt of the State of Alabama in violation of Article 11, Section 213 of the Constitution of Alabama, 1901, as amended by Amendment Number 26. It is further agreed that if any provision of this Agreement shall contravene any statute or Constitutional provision or amendment, either now in effect or which may, during the course of this Agreement, be enacted, then the conflicting provision in the Agreement shall be deemed null and void. This Professional Services Contract (the "Agreement") made and entered into on this the ____ day of _____, 2020, by and between The Auburn Game Day Law Enforcement Corporation, an Alabama corporation (the "Company"), the City of Auburn, Alabama, a municipal corporation (the "City") and City of Opelika/ Opelika Fire Department (Assisting Agency).

The parties hereby state and agree as follows:

1. The City has entered into a Professional Services Contract with Auburn University (the "University") whereby the City agrees to provide Law Enforcement Officers; Fire; Communications and Judicial personnel with the City as well as assisting agencies to provide security and traffic direction for University athletic and other special events.
2. City of Opelika/ Opelika Fire Department (Assisting Agency), acting in support of City of Auburn (Auburn) Public Safety/Police Division shall provide public safety services.
3. The Assisting Agency, acting in support of the City's Public Safety Department/Police Division, shall provide support services to include, but not limited to crowd control, traffic direction, and security at Auburn University campus locations during major sporting events and/or special events. Fire personnel shall provide support services to include, but not limited to airport standby, fire suppression, and EMS services.
4. The Assisting Agency shall render the above services under the direction and supervision of the City of Auburn Police Chief or his/her designee.
5. The Assisting Agency shall provide the above services during the time period from August 1, 2020 to July 31, 2021.
6. The Assisting Agency will be compensated by the City on behalf of the Company for the above services at the following rates: Fire Supervisor: \$38.00/hr.; Fire Non-supervisor: \$30.00/hr. The Assisting Agency's liability for services provided under this Agreement shall be limited to the intentional and/or negligent acts or omissions of its employees.
7. Agencies providing K9 Teams shall have their dog(s) leashed at all times in order to maintain control. In the event there is an area deemed unreachable, K9 teams may go through a supervisor to request an Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD) Technician conduct the search.
8. The Assisting Agency will receive compensation for services provided within ten working days of the receipt of an approved invoice.
9. The Assisting Agency **will not** be compensated for travel expenses.
10. The Company shall secure and provide to Assisting Agency's employees Workers Compensation Insurance.
11. The Assisting Agency agrees to comply with all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations in the performance of this Contract. Assisting Agency represents that it is an Equal Opportunity Employer and does not discriminate on the grounds of disability, age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, veteran status, genetic information or any other classification protected by Federal and/or Alabama state constitutional and/or statutory law.

In accordance with the Agreement for Engineering Services dated November 6, 2013 between CDG Engineers & Associates, Inc. ("ENGINEER") and City of Opelika ("OWNER"), this written amendment confirms the authorized and accepted additional services to be performed by the ENGINEER at the price or rates specified below.

ADDITIONAL SCOPE OF WORK IS AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE 1. Basic Services

Additional Structural Bridge Details

The bridge structure selected by the City of Opelika will require modification of standard ALDOT Precast Bridge Details to facilitate a wider bridge deck, which will accommodate additional roadway widening in the future if deemed necessary.

The detailed scope of work and exclusions for the project are presented below.

- 1.7 The ENGINEER will perform a structural analysis of the bridge superstructure based on modified bridge width, cast-in-place curb and guardrail bolted to curb as necessary for the OWNER-selected 42' clear roadway width precast bridge structure, with special design 90 degree wingwalls.
- 1.8 The ENGINEER will perform a structural analysis of the bridge substructure including pile loads for modified bridge width.
- 1.9 The ENGINEER will evaluate the wire rope abutment anchor configuration for 90 degree angle wingwalls.
- 1.10 The ENGINEER will prepare structural plan details as required for special design end bents, 90 degree angle wingwalls, modified abutment panels, bolt-on bridge curb, and modified wire rope assembly. The following ALDOT standard drawings will require modification: Indexes 51205, 51206, 51216, 51233, 51239, & 51260. All other necessary detailing will be referenced according to ALDOT Standard Drawings.

- 1.11 The ENGINEER will provide draft plans for OWNER review and approval. After addressing any comments, the ENGINEER will provide final signed and sealed plans.

Materials Report Revision

- 1.12 The ENGINEER will re-design the pavement section recommendations to align with recent traffic count data collected and provided by the OWNER.

Water Main Relocation

The City of Opelika (City) is requesting Engineering Services associated with the relocation of an existing 24-inch ductile iron (DI) water main in conflict with the proposed bridge replacement project. The main is operated by Opelika Utilities.

The existing main is located on the east side of the current bridge. The main is expected to be relocated for a distance between 250 to 300 linear feet on the same side as the existing main. In order to accommodate the relocation, along with the expected relocation of an 8-inch gas main (by Southeast Gas), it is anticipated that the new main will require an easement to be parallel to the existing right-of-way.

The project is expected to be incorporated into the overall plans for the bridge replacement project currently being designed by CDG for the City. Funds for the project are expected to be 100% City funds.

The detailed scope of work and exclusions for the project are presented below.

Design

- 1.13 The ENGINEER will establish & confirm existing topography and conditions.
- 1.14 The ENGINEER will develop a preliminary alignment and review with the City and Opelika Utilities (OU). The preliminary plan view sheet (30%) is anticipated to indicate the distance of the main from the existing edge of pavement, the location of the creek crossing, and the general configuration of tie-ins.
- 1.15 Following City and OU approval of the alignment, the ENGINEER will prepare draft-final (90%) construction plans. Plans shall include a plan and profile, as well as relevant details, which are expected to include details provided from OU.
- 1.16 The ENGINEER will prepare technical specifications and incorporate into the Contract Documents for the bridge replacement project.
- 1.17 The ENGINEER will review 90% plans and specifications with the City and OU and revised based on comments received.
- 1.18 The ENGINEER will complete and incorporate final plans and specifications into the Contract Documents prepared for the bridge replacement.

Permitting

- 1.19 It is anticipated that the water main will cross the tributary by open cut methods. As such, the ENGINEER will coordinate with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) in connection with the creek crossing. It is anticipated and contemplated that the work is covered by Nationwide Permit (NWP) 12 – Utility Line Activities under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. Individual permitting is not anticipated. The ENGINEER will submit the necessary permit application to the USACE on behalf of the City, along with City-provided permitting fees where applicable.

Easements

- 1.20 Easements are anticipated to include either a permanent easement, a temporary construction easement (TCE), or some combination thereof. The ENGINEER will assist the City and/or Opelika Utilities in obtaining any easements necessary by providing the following services:
- Research existing properties and field survey property and section corners as needed to establish a basis for developing easements.
 - Prepare tract sketches and easement descriptions based on final alignment. It is estimated that no more than two (2) descriptions will be needed.
 - Submit preliminary items to City and/or OU personnel for an initial review.
 - Address any comments from the initial review and submit final easement tract sketches and descriptions for the City or OU to secure the easement(s).

Exclusions

- Additional geotechnical investigations;
- Any alternative designs such as suspending on the bridge or piers, or boring.
- Title searches or appraisals for use in acquisition of easements;
- Easement negotiations;
- Environmental studies or reports;
- Wetland permitting;
- Environmental documentation of any level;
- FEMA flood studies or flood plain map revisions;
- Any agency fees associated with obtaining permits; and
- Construction observation/inspection services.

ARTICLE 4. Compensation

4.1.1 The OWNER agrees to pay to the ENGINEER, in cash, total compensation of **Thirty one Thousand, Four Hundred and 00/100 Dollars (\$31,400.00)**, to be paid periodically as work progresses for Additional Structural Bridge Details and Materials Report Revision per Paragraphs 1.7 - 1.12 above.

4.1.2 The OWNER agrees to pay to the ENGINEER, in cash, total compensation of **Eighteen Thousand, One Hundred and 00/100 Dollars (\$18,100.00)**, to be paid periodically as work progresses for Water Main Relocation per Paragraphs 1.13 - 1.20 above

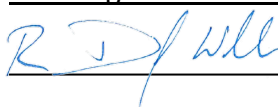

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), hereinafter referred to as the Memorandum, entered into on this ____ day of July, 2020, by and between Envision Opelika Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) an Alabama nonprofit corporation, whose address is 1103 Glenn Street, Opelika, Alabama 36801, as the fiscal sponsor of Creekline Trails of Opelika, an unincorporated association, hereinafter referred to as "Creekline Trails" and the City of Opelika, Alabama, whose address is 204 South 7th Street Opelika, Alabama 36801, hereinafter referred to as the "City," and collectively known as the "Parties," for the purpose of establishing and achieving various goals and objectives relating to the partnership.

WHEREAS, the aforementioned Parties desire to enter into the herein described agreement in which they shall work together to accomplish the goals and objectives set forth;

AND WHEREAS, the Parties are desirous to enter into an understanding, thus setting out all necessary working arrangements that both Parties agree shall be necessary to complete this partnership.

MISSION

The aforementioned partnership has been established with the following intended mission in mind:

To create a recreation system consisting of ADA-friendly multiuse paths and nature trails along scenic streams and major thoroughfares; greenways, greenspace, and pocket parks connected to parks, schools, and businesses; and a robust system of bike lanes for safe, alternative transportation throughout Opelika and beyond.

PURPOSE

AND

SCOPE

The Parties intend for this Memorandum of Understanding to provide the cornerstone and structure for any and all possibly impending binding contract which may be related to the partnership.

OBJECTIVES

Creekline Trails of Opelika and the City of Opelika have developed an excellent working relationship through which good progress has been achieved. In order to continue making progress, the Parties desire to formalize their relationship through this Memorandum of Understanding. The Parties shall endeavor to continue working together to develop and establish policies and procedures that will promote and sustain positive growth for the City and an increased quality of life of the residence and visitors. Whereas Creekline Trails intends the project will contribute to the goals of the City, its residents, and

organizations by preserving, protecting, and enhancing areas by creating new multiuse paths and alternative transportation routes; meet the physical and recreational needs of Opelika residents; contribute to the preservation of natural lands, neighborhood and city revitalization projects, and various programs designed to improve and promote community health; encourage outdoor activities, exercise, and environmental learning; and secure public greenspace and creek access for the community.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF THE PARTIES

It is the desire and the wish of the aforementioned Parties to this MOU Agreement that this document should not, and thus shall not, establish nor create any form or manner of a formal agreement or indenture but rather an agreement between the Parties to work together in such a manner that would promote a genuine atmosphere of collaboration and alliance in the support of an effective and efficient partnership and leadership meant to maintain, safeguard, and sustain sound and optimal managerial, financial, and administrative commitment with regards to all matters related to the partnership through means of the following individual services.

SERVICES

COOPERATION

Creekline Trails of Opelika shall render and provide the following services that include, but are not limited to:

- Manage, plan, and organize all grant applications, operational budget, fundraising opportunities, and construction and maintenance of the trail system.

City of Opelika, Alabama shall render and provide the following services that include, but are not limited to:

- Support, identify a designated City contact, provide letters of support for Creekline Trails grant applications, appropriate an additional sum of \$30,000 to the Foundation, which amount shall be used solely to advance the goals and objectives of Creekline Trails.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FOUNDATION

The Foundation is responsible for the overall management and supervision of Creekline Trails including the management of funds and accounts.

TIMELINE

The above outlined scope and objective shall be contingent on the Parties obtaining the necessary funds required for the partnership as described within any grant or business

loan application, if any. Responsibilities under this Memorandum of Understanding may coincide with the grant period.

TERMS OF UNDERSTANDING

The term of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be for a period of one year from the aforementioned effective date and may be extended upon written mutual agreement of both Parties.

AMENDMENT OR CANCELLATION OF THIS MEMORANDUM

This Memorandum of Understanding may be amended or modified at any time in writing by mutual consent of both Parties.

In addition, the Memorandum of Understanding may be cancelled by either party with 30 days' advance written notice, with the exception where cause for cancellation may include, but is not limited to, a material and significant breach of any of the provisions contained herein, when it may be cancelled upon delivery of written notice to the other party.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

The Parties acknowledge and understand that they must be able to fulfill their responsibilities under this Memorandum of Understanding in accordance with the provisions of the law and regulations that govern their activities. Nothing in the Memorandum is intended to negate or otherwise render ineffective any such provisions or operating procedures. The parties assume full responsibility for their performance under the terms of this Memorandum.

If at any time either party is unable to perform their duties or responsibilities under this Memorandum of Understanding consistent with such party's statutory and regulatory mandates, the affected party shall immediately provide written notice to the other party to establish a date for resolution of the matter.

LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

No rights or limitation of rights shall arise or be assumed between the Parties as a result of the terms of this Memorandum of Understanding.

NOTICE

Any notice or communication required or permitted under this Memorandum of Understanding shall be sufficiently given if delivered in person or by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the address set forth in the opening paragraph or to such address as one may have furnished to the other in writing.

GOVERNING**LAW**

This Memorandum of Understanding shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Alabama.

SEVERABILITY**CLAUSE**

In the event that any provision of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be deemed to be severable or invalid, and if any term, condition, phrase, or portion of this Memorandum shall be determined to be unlawful or otherwise unenforceable, the remainder of the Memorandum shall remain in full force and effect, so long as the clause severed does not affect the intent of the Parties. If a court should find that any provision of this Memorandum to be invalid or unenforceable, but that by limiting said provision it would become valid and enforceable, then said provision shall be deemed to be written, construed, and enforced as so limited.

ASSIGNMENT

Neither party to this Memorandum of Understanding may assign or transfer the responsibilities or agreement made herein without the prior written consent of the non-assigning party, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

ENTIRE**UNDERSTANDING**

The herein contained Memorandum of Understanding constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties pertaining to all matters contemplated hereunder at this time. The Parties signing this MOU desire or intend that any implementing contract, license, or other agreement entered into between the Parties subsequent hereto shall supersede and preempt any conflicting provision of this Memorandum of Understanding whether written or oral.

MOU**SUMMARY**

FURTHERMORE, the Parties to this MOU have mutually acknowledged and agreed to the following:

- The Parties to this MOU shall work together in a cooperative and coordinated effort and in such a manner and fashion to bring about the achievement and fulfillment of the goals and objectives of this partnership.
- It is not the intent of this MOU to restrict the Parties to this Agreement from their involvement or participation with any other public or private individuals, agencies, or organizations.
- The Parties to this MOU shall mutually contribute and take part in any and all phases of the planning and development of this partnership, to the fullest extent possible.

- It is not the intent or purpose of this MOU to create any rights, benefits, and/or trust responsibilities by or between the Parties.
- The MOU shall in no way hold or obligate either party to supply or transfer funds to maintain and/or sustain the partnership.
- Should there be any need or cause for the reimbursement or the contribution of any funds to or in support of the partnership, it shall then be controlled in accordance with Alabama governing laws, regulations, and/or procedures.
- In the event that contributed funds should become necessary, any such endeavor shall be outlined in a separate and mutually agreed upon written agreement by the Parties or representatives of the Parties in accordance with current governing laws and regulations, and in no way does this MOU provide such right or authority.
- The Parties to this MOU have the right to individually or jointly terminate their participation in this Agreement provided that advance written notice is delivered to the other party.
- Upon the signing of this MOU by both Parties, this Agreement shall be in full force and effect.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING
ORDINANCE AND ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF OPELIKA

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council (the “Council”) of the City of Opelika, Alabama
 (the “City”) as follows:

Section 1. FINDINGS. The Council has determined and hereby finds and declares that the following facts are true and correct:

- (a) DiBenedetto Enterprises, LLC, an Alabama limited liability company, (the “Company”) is the owner of record of that certain real property consisting of approximately 25.76 acres located at the intersection of Waverly Parkway and Veterans Parkway.

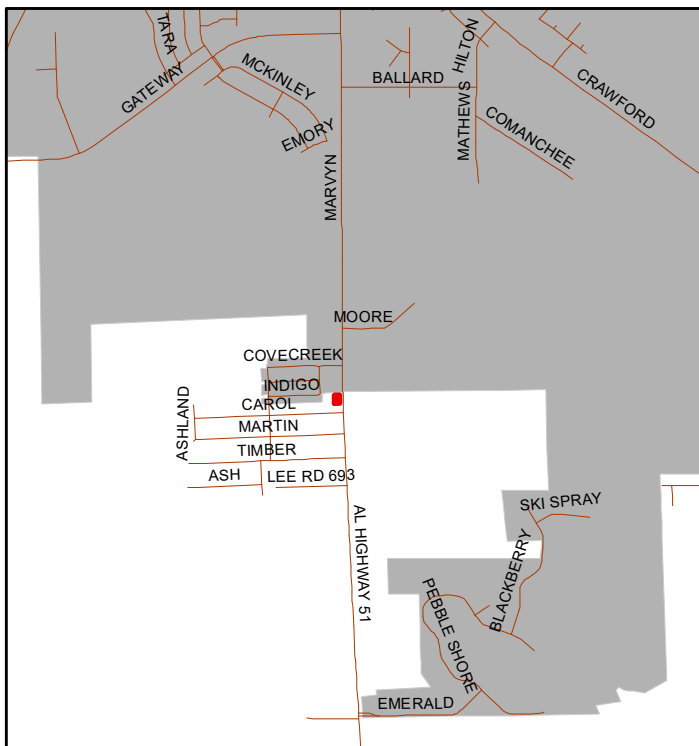
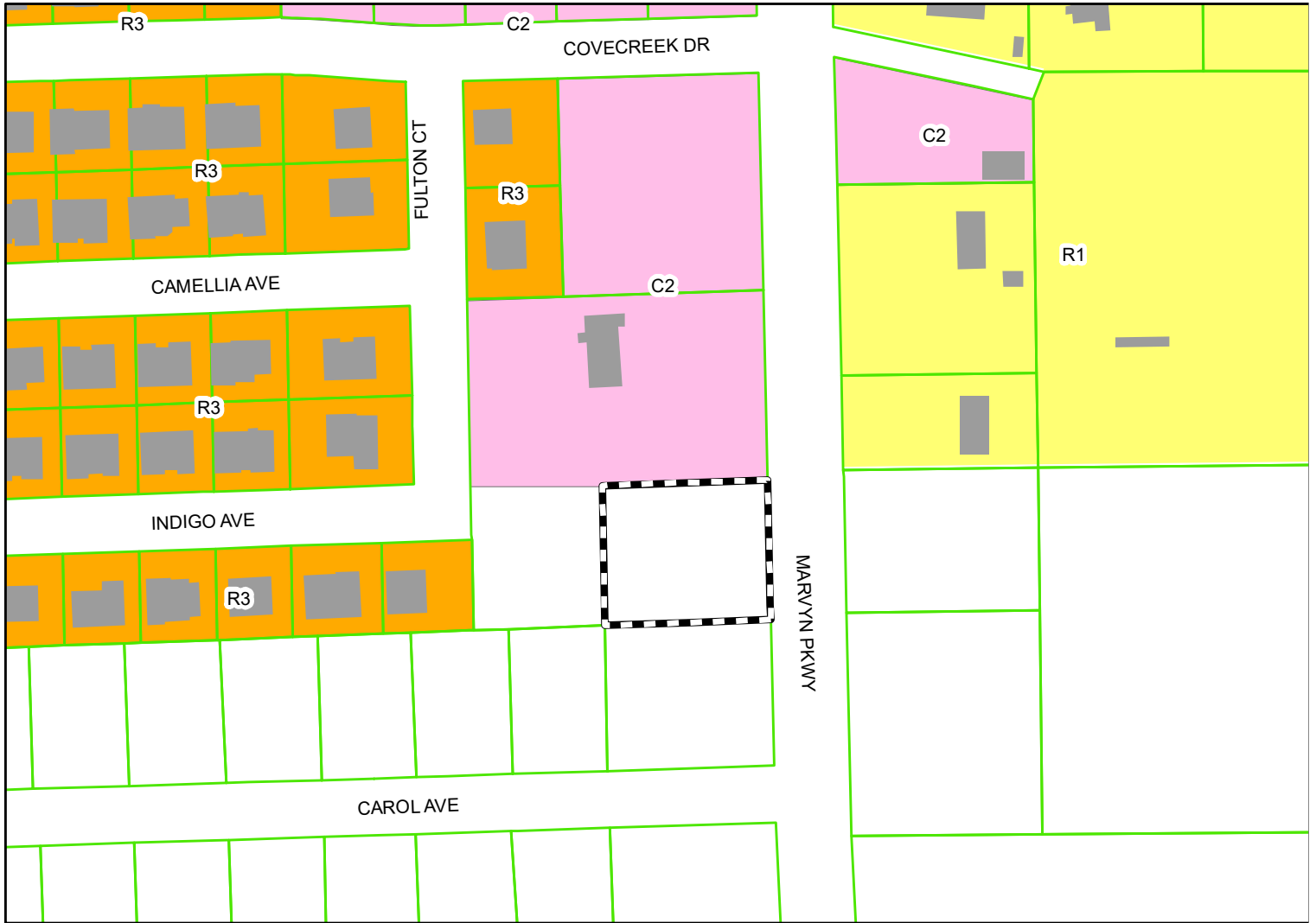

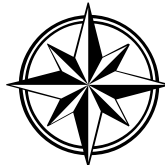

Staff Comments:
